Tell-tale signs from recent BBS surveys on changes in female mobility

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
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Are women becoming more mobile in income scale and physical mobility?


- Recent LFS 2016 and HIES 2016/17 indicate that may be this is happening
- No definitive analysis possible yet; but consider the following:
- Women's LFR only slightly risen, if at all, over time
- Their sector of employment remains largely agriculture, comparatively far more than for men
- Yet, we find that two things may be happening, they may be becoming far more mobile compared to men
- And secondly, the poverty incidence in female-headed households seems to be far lower than for male-headed households whereas female-headed households were generally thought to be poorer than others
- As and when unit records of LFS and HIES are available perhaps we can find some answers to these enigmatic findings if the paternalistic cage is slightly widening or this is simply a mirage

Trend in LFPR (%)


■ 2005/06 ■ 2010 ■ 2013 ■ 2015/16 ■ 2016/17




Sector of employment by sex
